

## **Primary PE and Sport Premium Funding**

The government has provided an extra £150 million of annual funding for the academic years of 2013 to 2014, 2014 to 2015, 2015 to 2016 and 2016 to 2017. The aim of this funding is to improve Physical Education (PE) and Sports programs offered by primary schools and is provided jointly by various governmental departments, including Education, Health and Culture and Media and Sport.

Funding for all schools is calculated by the number of primary-aged pupils between the ages of 5 and 11. All schools with seventeen or more primary-aged pupils will receive a lump sum of £8000, plus a premium of £5 per pupil. In September 2017, this amount was doubled for all schools, receiving a lump sum of £16,000, plus £10 per pupil.

The Sports Premium is 'ring fenced', meaning it can only be spent specifically on PE and Sport within the school and must be used to increase the breadth of PE and Sport provision and increase participation in PE and Sport.

***How we spent the PE and Sport Premium in the academic years 2013-2014, 2014-2015, 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 is outlined below.***

<b>The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – kick-starting healthy active lifestyles</b>	Premier Sport to continue providing an active lunch club on the KS2 playground.	We wanted to provide children with additional opportunities to be physically active during their lunch break, leading to raised fitness levels and improved health, promoting team work with children from across the school, supporting a healthy lifestyle and encouraging lifelong participation and enjoyment in physical activity. The organised activities worked well at the start of the year when there was access to the field, as there was more space to play. It became less feasible during the winter months, either resulting in wet play or less space available for other children who were not involved in the activities. The coaches did not always actively encourage children to participate, waiting for them to join in; games were repetitive, usually dodgeball. With an extra adult running organised physical activities, we hoped to reduce playground incidents with children being actively engaged for prolonged periods of time. <p><b>Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport</b></p>	<p>Premier Sport, outside provider, to continue leading and supporting PE lessons.</p>	<p>Professional sports specialists were employed to raise the skills of the young people at our school, raise standards in PE through consistent high quality curriculum provision, and subsequently up-skill our UKS2 staff through CPD opportunities during lessons. In the summer term, the coaches worked with children and staff in Years 1 and 3, so they could also benefit from observing sport specific skills and deepening their knowledge alongside the specialist coaches.</p> <p>This year, we felt that the coaching and expertise provided by Premier Sport were not up to the standard we had received previously. The lessons did not always demonstrate progression and some activities were heavily relied upon. The coaches changed throughout the year, meaning there was a greater inconsistency in the coaching our children received, along with the application of our school's behaviour policy. From a CPD aspect, the coaches were less encouraging towards team teaching with our staff. After several meetings and communications where issues were addressed, the school felt, moving forward, we would not renew our contract with the company. **Broader experience of a range of sports and activities and activities offered to all pupils**

*The purchase of a Quicksticks Hockey Class pack.*

After the enthusiasm of the children towards Quicksticks Hockey last year, both in the preparation for and during the tournament, we wished to update our old, plastic hockey equipment to enable us to prepare more adequately. The equipment was ordered, alongside a pack of activity cards and lesson resources. Our school LTP has been adjusted to include the teaching of hockey in Years 3, 5 and 6 to utilize this new equipment. Although we were unable to enter the tournament this year, due to a clash of dates, the children have remained very keen on this sport, with a large number attending initial trials to gauge interest. We hope to enter the tournament in 2017-2018.

Premier Sport to provide extra-curricular after-school sports clubs for pupils across the school.

Having surveyed the classes in July 2016 to find out which clubs they would like to attend, we planned to offer 6 different afterschool clubs throughout the year, rather than 3 (Handball, KS1&KS2 Gymnastics, Hockey, Cricket, KS1 Multi-Skills). We hoped that an increase in the variety of sports available to pupils that they had been involved in selecting, would encourage them to participate. In September 2016, Premier Sport came into the school to run an assembly to advertise the clubs in the hope of inspiring the children and improving the uptake in these clubs. The assembly was not as visual as we had hoped, which was fed back to the company afterwards. There was also a delay in getting the letters to the children detailing their sign-up procedures. The coaches we were provided with changed during the course of the year. Numbers fluctuated between the different activities, but were not as high as we would have hoped. All clubs had spaces.
